DRACULA!

by Bram Stoker adapted by Liz Lockhead Directed by Kerrin White

WARNING: contains nudity, strong language, scenes of a sexual nature and strobe lighting effects

Long before the teen vampires of 21st century popular culture, Bram Stoker's original tale chilled Victorian audiences with a mysterious Eastern European nobleman who insinuates his dangerous, sensual presence into the bedchambers of proper English ladies. Bram Stoker's classic vampire novel has been adapted by Liz Lochhead, a prominent Scottish playwright and poet. The fabled figures of Jonathan Harker, the archetypal innocent abroad, Mina Westerman, his anxious fiancé, the prophetic lunatic Renfield, Van Helsing and, of course, Count Dracula himself and his tragic victim Lucy are brought brilliantly to life in this adaptation for the stage which stays refreshingly close to Bram Stoker's original while grounding the whole story in a believable reality.

Director Kerrin White is very excited to be involved in this production, "Dracula is a name that everyone grows up knowing, even if you've never read the novel or seen one of the many films". There have been dozens of film adaptations over the years but Kerrin says that "this play is a much more authentic portrayal of the Dracula tale than the tacky films of the 60s and 70s when camp horror was in vogue".

Dracula is essentially a gothic tale: it wasn't the first vampire tale, but it certainly created the mould for western audiences. It is the story of Count Dracula's attempt to move from Transylvania to England, the battle between Dracula and a small group of men and women led by ProfessorAbraham Van Helsing.

Van Helsing (played by Brian Knott) is a Dutch doctor with a wide range of interests and accomplishments, and is best known as a vampire hunter and becomes the archenemy of Count Dracula.

Count Dracula (played by Robert Drusetta) is a centuriesold vampire, from Transylvanian nobility who inhabits a decaying castle in the Carpathian Mountains. Unlike the vampires of Eastern European folklore, which are portrayed as repulsive, corpse-like creatures, Dracula exudes a veneer of aristocratic charm. In the Rep's production, Robert will take Dracula to new heights with

his physical presence overshadowing those around him.

Jonathan Harker (Sandy Adams) is a fresh-faced solicitor who travels to Count Dracula's crumbling, remote castle in Transylvania. He is tasked with what should be a straight-forward real estate transaction, but soon realises he is being held prisoner. There are sprites in the castle, referred to in modern adaptations as the Brides of Dracula. Dracula uses Harker to obtain advice about life in England and then abandons him to the Brides.

Meanwhile Dracula leaves Transylvania for London and seeks out Harker's fiancée Mina Westerman (played by Anna Bampton) and her sister Lucy (Lani Gerbi). Lucy soon comes to the notice of Count Dracula and begins to waste away suspiciously. Professor Van Helsing is called from abroad and immediately determines the cause of Lucy's condition but refuses to disclose it.

AUGUST: OSAGE COUNTY

June 19 - 28

August: Osage County is set on the plains of modern day, middle-class Oklahoma. The Weston family members are all intelligent, sensitive creatures who have the uncanny ability of making each other absolutely miserable. When the patriarch of the household mysteriously vanishes, the Weston clan gathers together to simultaneously support and attack one another.

The story begins in August and the action takes place over several weeks in the home of Beverly and Violet Weston in Osage County, Oklahoma. Beverly is a poet and has a drinking problem while his wife suffers from mouth cancer and has become addicted to drugs. The story begins when Beverly is trying to hire a new live-in cook and caregiver for Violet.

A series of conflicts ensue over the next several days as Violet and Barbara have never understood each other and the other sisters and their partners are embroiled in scandals.

The text is rich with compelling characters and scintillating criticism of the modern American family. Having won the the 2008 Pulitzer Prize for Drama, along with a sway of Tony's and other Awards, it has been hailed a modern classic.

Following successful runs on Broadway and the West End, as well as touring across America; playwright Tracy Letts has adapted his drama for the silverscreen. A stellar Hollywood cast has brought the play to the screen. Meryl Streep, Julia Roberts and Juliette Lewis star as the Weston family with a supporting cast including Ewan McGregor, Benedict Cumberbatch and Dermot Mulroney.

This play will run for approximately 3 hours.

Much of the focus of this play is on Dracula's experiences in England, particularly one in an insane asylum. It is here that Dracula comes across Renfield (Matt Houston) an insane man who feeds on insects and other creatures. Once Dracula is revealed as a vampire, this connection with Renfield will play a vital part in the coalition of vampire hunters, led by Van Helsing. Liz Lochhead's adaptation was first produced in 1985 at the Royal Lyceum in Edinburgh. It has been heralded as a feminist reading of Stoker's text, with more focus on the nuances of character and particularly the appeal of Count Dracula from a woman's perspective. Lochhead has recently acknowledged that her adaptation was influenced by Freudian psychoanalysis and symbolism.

With such a well-known text, Lochhead has admitted that it was impossible to ignore all of the retellings. Recently she has spoken of her influence by specific adaptations which she wove into the dialogue as subtle jokes and references to contemporary re-tellings.

Bram (Abraham) Stoker (born 1847) worked at the Lyceum Theatre in London for actor Sir Henry

Irving and was a prolific writer, although his success in life was limited. Whilst some contemporaries such as Arthur Conan Doyle praised Stoker's work, he died penniless in London in 1912. In 1922 the first film adaptation was made, without authority from Stoker's estate and his widow successfully sued the filmmakers. The resulting publicity created a thirst for Stoker's works and he became more popular in death than he was in life.
