Crimes of the Heart is a play by American playwright Beth Henley. It is set in Hazlehurst, Mississippi in the mid-20th century.

The play won the 1981 Pulitzer Prize for Drama and was nominated for the Tony Award for Best Play. In 1986, the play was novelized and released as a book, written by Claudia Reilly. This play is a Dramedy, a comedy with dramatic moments.

Three eccentric sisters from a small Southern town are rocked by scandal when Babe, the youngest, shoots her husband. The sisters unite with an intense young lawyer to save Babe from a murder charge, and overcome their family's painful past.

Babe's husband, Zackery, whom she has just shot, is a powerful and wealthy lawyer. Eventually, she reveals that the shooting was the result of her anger at Zackery's cruel treatment both of her and of Willie Jay, a 15-year-old African American boy with whom she's been having an affair.

#### "I've had a fortunate life"

Barbara Saunders, a life member of the Adelaide Rep, passed away following an operation at the RAH last Wednesday, 15 January 2020. Her funeral was held on Friday 31 January.

Barbara shared many decades of enjoyment with the REP, as a player, a board member and in more recent years as an audience member.

Barb Saunders as a young woman was in 'Pride & Prejudice' with the late Keith Michelle, as an actress she was most prolific during the 1970s and 80s being in over a dozen Rep productions during that period. Norm Caddick directed her in 'Ghost Train' in 1988 where she spent the majority of Act 2 asleep on a table in the station waiting room. (not very comfortable for a by then, elderly actress)

Barbara was a former Miss South Australia, who went on to have a career in television and marketing. She was still doing television commercials as she approached 90. Barbara was Rotarian and a Paul Harris Fellow.

She was the loved wife of the late Reg. Loving mother and mother-in-law to Robert (deceased), Nigel and Helen, Penny and Rod, Ngaire and Wayne.

Adored Grandma Barb to Rebecca and Andrew, Ben and Helen, Eddie and Theo, Michael and Jemima, Helen and Macca, Jacqui and Steve, Kat and Michael, Gen and Nick, Sam and Aisling, Patrick and Sophia, Joshua (deceased), and Tess.

Much loved Great-Grandma Barb to 15 Great-Grandchildren. Dearly loved and respected by her family and friends in Australia and overseas.

#### VALE PHYL SKINNER

Phyliss Joyce (nee Skinner) BOER OAM

23.10.1922 - 23.10.2020

Passed away on her 98th birthday. Beloved wife of Max (deceased). Dearly loved Aunty Phyl to Vicki, Greg and Jill. Great-Aunty to Madi. Friend of all but especially Peter Goers and Malcolm Harslett. A long life well-lived, entertaining and helping others. Now resting peacefully and dearly missed.

Some snippets from an article written by Katie Spain, Lifestyle reporter, the Advertiser.

The Adelaide-born Vaudeville legend first hit the stage as a snowflake in a local production, aged five. She was a natural tickler of funny bones but had her heart set on ballet.

"I could dance, do acrobats and the splits at the drop of a hat but I was a ballerina," she said. Until she hit puberty. When womanly curves appeared, family friend Mary Helpmann (mother of Sir Robert Helpmann) suggested she try Vaudeville. "Vaudeville! They were common girls ... ew, they told dirty stories," Ms Skinner recalled, laughing. "We were ballerinas."

The artform's music, sequins and cheeky elements eventually won the performer over and she went on to tour with Australian greats such as George Wallace and Roy 'Mo' Rene whose iconic statue can be seen on Hindley St.

Skinner wowed audiences all over the nation with her physical feats, cheeky stage presence and shock of red hair.

She never looked back, surviving war, a heart attack, a pacemaker and diabetes during her ongoing career.

"In all these years I've never stopped," she said "I don't fear death," she said. "Yesterday is history, tomorrow is a mystery, today is the present and today is a gift."

Her signature move was to strum her raised leg like a banjo. When she's on stage, the years dropped away. "I come to life in front of an audience," she said.

"The magic of the lights and the music has never been lost. It was drummed in to me as a child ... when the music starts and you know your routine you have to forget everything. The audience has paid money to be there."

Skinner prided herself on lifting people's spirits.

Phyl's final show for The Rep was 'The Mystery of the Hansom Cab' in 2013.


#### Message from the Chair Ray Trowbridge

Without any income from hiring companies we realised it was going to be a very difficult year but at the same time we would never have a better opportunity to do much needed maintenance and renovations.

Starting backstage, we have completely worked over the two dressing rooms with new paint, mirrors, carpets as well renovating the actors toilet/shower areas. The backstage kitchen also had a complete makeover thanks to the very generous donation of our board member, Liz Olsson.

We then moved to the foyer. I am confident you will all agree it is a substantial improvement with new paint, a TV display and theatre curtains. The foyer toilets have also had a major makeover with new paint, tiles and wash-hand basins.



As I believe most of you are aware, our planned 2020 season has now been moved to 2021. All subscriber books purchased in 2020 are also moved to 2021. Of course the dates on each voucher will be incorrect but current dates are on our 2021 season brochure as well as our website, adelaiderep.com. Rehearsals were well underway for our first production of the year, Crimes of the Heart when we had to shut down.

Award winning director, Geoff Brittain is one of Adelaide's most respected directors. For The Rep he brought us the hugely popular Diary of Anne Frank and The Miracle Worker and late last year he directed Things I Know To Be True for St. Jude Players. I am confident Crimes of the Heart will be equally popular with our patrons.

After three years of holding the position of Chairman, I will stepping down from the board. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as Chairman working alongside a very dedicated and hard working group of people on the board. For the Adelaide Repertory Theatre, Gordon appeared in 'Dad's Army' 2005 and 'The Sneeze' in 2009. Had to stop production when he was taken away to have his gall bladder removed. Ever the trouper, he was back soon after to finish the season.

Gordon appeared in many shows for the Therry Society. Jill Bartlett, the President of the Therry Society says, "Gordon was a reprobate but we loved him to pieces.

Gordon died on the 8th July, just 5 days before his 95th birthday. We will remember you Gordon with much love and also with your favourite saying – "Yachidar Boobie!!!!!"
