We'll Always Have Paris" is one of the most memorable lines in film. It comes from the 1942 classic

'Casablanca', when the cynical ex-pat Rick tells his former lover Ilsa: 'We'll always have Paris.'

Rick is referring to their brief romance on the eve of World War II, a courtship



that ended abruptly with the Nazi invasion of France. When he speaks those words to Ilsa in the movie's final scene, Rick has accepted that he and Ilsa will

never be reunited but at least they will always have that one cherished

memory.

And Trekkies will know that 'We'll Always Have Paris' is the twenty-fourth episode of the first season of the American television series Star Trek: The Next

Generation, which first aired in 1998.

About Jill Hyem Actor and Writer

Hyem scripted the hit TV series Tenko, a drama about the lives of women imprisoned in a Japanese internment camp.

She was born in Putney, south-west London. From the age of eight, her ambition was to be an actor and, after leaving school, she trained at the Webber Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art in London.

She appeared in repertory theatre in High Wycombe, Watford and Worthing, and in the West End as Pamela Fordyce in the comedy 'Goodnight Mrs Puffin'. In television, Hyem played Peggy Briggs, daughter of Jimmy Edwards's tuba player, in the sitcom 'Bold as Brass'. She also had bit parts in several popular series and B-movies. However, playing "an assortment of nurses, air hostesses, dreary daughters, gangsters' molls and French maids convinced Hyem that she should become a writer and create challenging parts for women.

She began in radio, which remained her favourite medium.

She co-created, 'Waggoners' Walk', set in a large town house divided up into flats.

Hyem was then asked to write 'Tenko'. She went on to create 'Wish Me Luck' (1987-



90), about female agents behind enemy lines in the second

She served on the Writers Guild of Great Britain's executive council and was made an honorary member of the guild in 2007.

Peter was born to the young couple on the 6th Feb 1969 followed fairly rapidly 15 months later by Kristen on 31st May


42 years later, Peter and Amanda presented Brian and Barb with a gorgeous granddaughter, Lila who was born on the 4th Feb in 2011.

Kristen and James became foster parents to Natasha.

Despite being a good musician, Brian had no interest in the performing arts until his involvement with Theatre '62. It was during this period that he developed a love of the theatre. He played many support roles as an actor for the Next Stage Theatre Co., the Therry and the Met. He learned to tap dance and was good at it, no doubt because of his already keen athletic skills. He joined a troupe, the Good Time Entertainers, where he developed new friendships.

When Barb Messenger took over the management of the ARTS theatre, Brian took over the management of the bar at the ARTS and worked there for 12 years as a volunteer. He was always happy working behind that bar. He was a people lots of them.

Production Team Coordinator will be required to:

Effectively plan for production crew requirements including scheduling for all four productions in the year.

Organise, schedule and supervise the successful bump in and bump out of company events, ensuring the safety of staff and artists while minimising wear and tear or damage to equipment and venue.

Production Team Coordinator will be responsible for:

Supervision and delegation of tasks for all volunteer back stage production staff with regard to production schedules.

Scheduling the annual work program as per the needs to the artistic program.

Undertaking specific training of the volunteer with reference to their areas of expertise.

Production Team Coordinator will generally be required to:

Act as the primary contact point for all back stage production crew.

Plan long term for production activities in conjunction with the Board.

Oversee the updates on WH&S documentation to ensure all company policies are in line with the act and regulation, as well as accepted national standards for best practice.
