An iconic Australian play set amidst the backdrop of the widely anticipated Whitlam victory in the 1969 Federal Election.

This is a play about broken dreams – Whitlam's election loss and those of the characters we meet at the Party.

Labor supporter, Don Henderson and his wife Kath, host a party for their friends on election night 1969. The guests are in their 30s and are facing the reality that they have not achieved what they set out to do after leaving university. They had dreams and aspirations. Yet now they find themselves stuck in suburbia.

Williamson has said that the play is about the reality check that happens to people in their thirties when all their dreams are facing the cold hard test of time.

During the party it becomes clear that Labor aren't going to win the election, and most of the small "L" liberal guests begin to drown their sorrows. As the drinking increases, harsh realities are raised amongst the group of friends. They snipe at each other and begin to criticise to the point of ugliness. They become crass, beerswilling, womanising men and they show no respect towards women. It provides us with a unique snapshot of Australia at the end of the 1960s.

Don's Party shocked audiences when it was first performed in 1972 with its use of course language and gratuitous themes of sex, marriage and infidelity.

The group we meet at Don's Party is diverse, from conservative middle class professionals, to wilder, more liberated artists and young professionals who are experimenting with the great sexual revolution of the 1960s.

Don's Party was made famous by Bruce Beresford's film portrayal starring Graham Kennedy in 1976. The film was a lot more risqué than the play; although audiences should expect course language and adult themes.

Williamson has been called "the great man of Australian theatre". The Club and Don's Party are iconic plays, both having been made into successful films. Williamson is still writing and recently produced Don Parties On, a sequel to Don's Party nearly 40 years on. His screenplays have brought aspects of Australia's history into living rooms around the nation, Gallipoli, Phar Lap, The Year of Living Dangerously, and the recent Balibo, to name just a few.

Special Car-parking Rates

Patrons to the ARTS Theatre are entitled to the special rate of \$8 parking at the Moore St Carpark. Whilst many of the car parking spaces are reserved by day, this only applies until 6pm. This means theatre-goers can park there any time after 6pm and disregard the "Reserved" signage.

The car park operates on a pay and display arrangement. The Moore St Carpark is the closest public carpark to the Theatre and is located behind the Royalty Theatre on Moore St (and is opposite our stage door!!)

A Classic Australian Comedy by the iconic David Williamson



Don's Party arrived on the theatre scene in Australia in 1972 with the same impact of the character Cooley when he arrives at the party in the play. It's energetic, fun and exhilaratingly frank. Set on federal election night 1969, the play reflects Williamson's interest in struggle and conflict in group situations – but in a particularly Australian way.

David Williamson's work as a playwright focuses on themes of politics, loyalty and family in contemporary urban Australia. He is probably the most well-known Australian playwright, having written over 40 plays and over 20 screenplays.

All My Sons

Written by Arthur Miller Directed by Dave Simms The play that launched Arthur Miller's career, All My Sons tells a powerful story about the American dream. It is a family drama about moral responsibility in the wake of World War II and the companies that profited from it.

Joe Keller is a self-made businessman. He is embroiled in controversy because his company supplied faulty parts to the Air Force during the War, causing twenty-one planes to crash. His business partner was incarcerated over it however Joe was exonerated of any crimes.

Joe and his family must deal with this knowledge and try to reconcile their quilt. This is complicated by the fact that son Larry is missing in action and his brother Chris has fallen for his girl Ann.

All My Sons is a captivating tale which has recently experienced a revival on both the West End and Broadway. When it was first produced in 1947, it won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award and the Tony Award for best author and best direction of a play at its opening in 1947.

Helen Geoffreys was to direct All My Sons for the Rep, however owing to unforeseen circumstances she has reluctantly withdrawn. Dave Simms, who most recently directed Lips Together, Teeth Apart for Mixed Salad has stepped in to direct and is looking forward to bringing this classic American play to Adelaide audiences.
