



You're invited to the classiest soiree of the season.

When a stranger crashes the party of the upwardly mobile Sir Robert Chiltern and his wife Gertrude and threatens to expose the long-buried secret to his success, the Chilterns enter a world of blackmail, hypocrisy

and corruption and both have to face up to their own ideals and prejudices about each other along the way.

Meanwhile, among the fat cats, dowdies and dandies of London society, the Chilterns friend Arthur Goring is begrudgingly searching for a wife, and with his sights set on Robert's sister Mabel, the stage is set for Oscar Wilde's most serious and glittering comedy of manners.

The third of his major plays, 'An Ideal Husband' is both Wilde's most modern and most personal. First performed in 1895, just before Wilde's monumental and much documented fall from grace, the story of a flawed public figure facing destruction must have resonated with his own situation.

In its 115th season, this production of 'An Ideal Husband' marks the completion of all the major Wilde works by the Adelaide Rep. With its unique blend of melodrama and farce, like the best pop tunes from the 1980s, the production counts a perfect blend of some of Adelaide's best comic actors, alongside some new faces sure to bring a breath of fresh air to the Arts Theatre.


This is Director Matthew Chapman's second production for the Rep, following on from the 2020 covid season production 'The Rivals' (nominee 2020/21 TASA ComiCAL award). Last year he directed 'Arcadia' for the University of Adelaide Theatre Guild (pending 2022 TASA DramatiCAL award nominee). As an actor, Matt has appeared in productions for a number of Adelaide theatre companies, often in calfrevealing period costumes. Matt is pleased to celebrate a minor anniversary (and major achievement for the rep) after making his stage debut in their 100th anniversary production.

The Author Oscar Wilde

Oscar Fingal O'Fflahertie
Wills Wilde (16 October 1854
– 30 November 1900) was an
Irish poet and playwright. After
writing in different forms
throughout the 1880s, he
became one of the most
popular playwrights in London
in the early 1890s.

Oscar Wilde's rich and dramatic portrayals of the human condition came during the height of the prosperity that swept through London in the Victorian Era of the late



19th century. At a time when all citizens of Britain were finally able to embrace literature the wealthy and educated could only once afford, Wilde wrote many short stories, plays and poems that continue to inspire millions around the world.

He is best remembered for his epigrams and plays, his novel 'The Picture of Dorian Gray' and the circumstances of his criminal conviction for gross indecency for consensual homosexual acts in "one of the first celebrity trials", imprisonment, and early death from meningitis at the age of 46. 'An Ideal Husband' is a comedic play by Oscar Wilde. It was first performed in London in 1895. In the play, a man must stop his wife from finding out that he's built his entire career on selling out political secrets. The play exposes the problems with high society and deals with complex moral themes in a comic way.


The play is set in 19th-century London, and the main character is Sir Robert Chiltern. Robert is a popular politician and member of the House of Commons. He does whatever it takes to succeed, and he's not above blackmail and fraudulent activities. His wife, Gertrude, has no idea that most of his wealth comes from illegal acts.

The Rep grew from humble beginnings in piano teacher/composer Bryceson Treharne's classroom in the Elder Conservatorium, North Terrace, Adelaide, the organization now known as The Adelaide Repertory Theatre (affectionately now known as The Rep) began in 1908.

The company prospered, and at the beginning of 1914, changed its name to The Adelaide Repertory Theatre.

Still The Rep had no permanent home, until, in February 1950, the site at 53 Angas Street was purchased and a Building Fund Appeal launched.

The Building Fund slowly grew, but, not surprisingly, costs of construction escalated. Happily in 1963, the foundations were laid and patrons and past supporters urged to contribute to the building of their own theatre, The Adelaide Repertory Theatre Arts Theatre. A commemorative plaque was unveiled by the Governor, Sir Edric Bastyan in February 1963 and The Advertiser reported "it will be a significant event in the history of Australia's oldest community theatre for it will be one of the final steps in the attainment of the Society's lifelong aim, occupation of its own theatre." The play chosen for the opening production was Romanoff and Juliet to be directed by Rep legend, Dame Ruby Litchfield.

Community theatre is a place of new discoveries and lifelong learning. It can open your eyes to a new hobby, a new relationship or a new path in life. It contributes to the arts in our community, as well as teaching many important skills such as teamwork, problem solving, and confidence in public speaking. It strengthens a community's cultural environment, provides catharsis to its participants and viewers and is a safe place for people of all ages, cultures and experiences to come together and work towards a common goal.
