It's a dark and stormy night. The stars are out. Jim, the inn-keeper's granddaughter, opens the door to a terrifying stranger.

At the old sailor's feet sits a huge sea-chest, full of secrets.

Jim invites him in and her dangerous voyage begins. Jim Hawkins in this version is now Jemima, but she refuses to conform to either gender stereotype.

Her desire of adventure takes over as she resolves to find the treasure of legendary Captain Flint. Armed with a treasure map, Jim and the crew of the Hispaniola brave the stormy seas to reach Treasure Island.

With Jim we go on a swashbuckling and gruesomely comic adventure for all the family. We meet Long John Silver, a motley crew of pirates, and of course, a parrot.

This new adaptation of Robert Louis Stevenson's classic pirate adventure was first performed at Britain's National Theatre. It has a fresh take on the classic story, thrilling, streamlined, and filled with music and humour.

Lavery's script follows the basic plot of Robert Louis Stevenson's book, yet offers some much needed modernisation. Jim Hawkins becomes tomboy Jemima Hawkins and Lavery adds in several light-hearted jokes about this switch.

Although the novel may have been intended for children, Lavery's adaptation will instill a childlike feeling of adventure into any adult in the audience.




First published in the 1880s, 'Treasure Island' has been enthusiastically received in words, on the stage and in film by generations of boys, girls and grown-ups. The story, largely told in the first person, tells of Jim Hawkin's discovery of a treasure map, and his adventure as a cabin boy on board the Hispaniola and the murderous events on Treasure Island itself. It's a classic bildungsroman (a literary genre that focuses on the psychological and moral growth of the protagonist from childhood to adulthood (coming of age), in which character change is important), charting Jim's development from innocent youth to adulthood and his experiences of friendship, bravery and honour.

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The Director Megan Dansie

Megan has been involved in theatre for over 50 years, although she can't quite believe that figure is correct. She started with the Bunyip Children's Theatre mainly playing animals and old women. Her acting experience is



varied, including Elizabeth Proctor in 'The Crucible', Jodie in 'Don's Party', Mrs Mercy in 'The Killing of Sister George' and most recently as Lady Markby in 'An Ideal Husband'.

Megan has a particular love for Shakespeare, even though he has very few pirates. She has directed many award-winning shows, including 'The Crucible' (Burnside Players) 'The Pillowman' (UATG), and 'Richard III' (UTAG). Her most recent play for the Rep was the popular 'A Christmas Carol'.

Scottish novelist,
essayist, poet and
travel writer. He is best
known for works such
as 'Treasure Island',
'Strange Case of Dr



Jekyll and Mr Hyde', 'Kidnapped' and 'A Child's Garden of Verses'.

Born and educated in Edinburgh, Stevenson suffered from serious bronchial trouble for much of his life, but continued to write prolifically and travel widely in defiance of his poor health. As a young man, he mixed in London literary circles, receiving encouragement from Andrew Lang, Edmund Gosse, Leslie Stephen and W. E. Henley, the last of whom may have provided the model for Long John Silver in *'Treasure Island'*. In 1890, he settled in Samoa where, alarmed at increasing European and American influence in the South Sea islands, his writing turned away from romance and adventure fiction toward a darker realism. He died of a stroke in his island home in 1894 aged 44.

A celebrity in his lifetime, Stevenson's critical reputation has fluctuated since his death, though today his works are held in general acclaim. In 2018, he was ranked, just behind Charles Dickens, as the 26th-most-translated author in the world.

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Message from President David Sinclair

As we approach the end of another wonderful year of theatre, I would like to personally thank all the amazing people who enable the REP to continue to produce live theatre in the heart of our great city of Adelaide (recently named the "coolest" city in Australia).

Thank you to all our amazing production teams, talented cast members, bump in and backstage crews, our friendly front of house and bar crews who all volunteer their valuable time. Without the generous support and dedication of our volunteers, the REP simply could not operate.

This year has seen several changes to the Board membership. Rose Vallen continues her REP involvement working tirelessly as our Office Manager. I cannot thank her enough for everything she does.

It is fair to say, the REP finds itself at a critical juncture. We are the only amateur theatre company in South Australia (possibly Australia) which also owns and operates a significant theatre venue in the CBD of a capital city. The ARTS theatre is the home to so many other amateur theatre companies. Our decisions and plans not only concern our beloved REP but also have a direct impact on community theatre more broadly.

As owners of The Arts Theatre, the Board recognizes we have an obligation to continue to provide a venue which meets the needs of our hirers as well as those of our theatre patrons now and into the future. We must also ensure we continue to comply with all relevant government safety and building regulations.

Over the first 60 years of its life, a conservative estimate of individual productions mounted at the ARTS would be in excess of 1,200 plays and musicals. It is arguably the most heavily used theatre in South Australia with fewer dark nights than other "mainstream" professional theatres such as the Her Majesty Theatre, Festival Theatre and Dunstan Playhouse.

Unfortunately, not everybody is able to experience live theatre at The Arts. We believe we have a responsibility to all theatregoers to provide a fully accessible theatre so that everyone can feel welcome, comfortable and safe whilst attending a production.

To that aim, we are in the process of developing a Master Plan for "The Arts Theatre Accessibility Redevelopment Project". We are still in the early stages and are in discussion and consultation with key stakeholders, architects and other interested parties.

This is going to be a very costly project and we will be looking to raise funds through all avenues including Donations, Grants, Bequests and other campaigns. The REP cannot fund the



redevelopment from general operations and therefore we are relying on the Government, The Adelaide City Council, Businesses, our Hirers, individuals and organizations and the corporate sector to help.

The original construction of theatre was funded by a Building Fund Appeal, now known as "crowd sourced funding". The people of Adelaide came together and built a theatre. We are asking South Australians to donate again to help keep the ARTS alive in Adelaide.




